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Research Source Sheet Lit & More

Printing Instructions: Print these documents double-sided or print them and copy them to be front and back. I suggest putting them onto cardstock, and I always make mine yellow, so the students sometimes call them “yellow sheets.” After they are printed, cut them in half.

In-class Use: These source sheets can be assigned at the beginning of any research assignment. Students must use the front side to gather information about their source, then use MLA or APA handbooks to organize them into proper citations. The backside is where they prove they have read their source, taking bulletpoint notes that don't take too much time. At the bottom, they indicate where this research will go in their paper or project.

Objectives:

- This resource will assist students in creating citations according to MLA or APA guidelines.
- This resource will track the student's research process, ensuring they have thought through the full scope of their assignment and given thought as to how they will use their findings.
